

EUROPEAN ACADEMY ON YOUTH WORK - WORKSHOP REPORT

Innovation and Quality in Youth Work: Exploring Research Data from RAY, the European Network for the Research-Based Analysis of the European Youth Programmes

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MAIN CONTEXT

RAY has conducted a research project on competence development and capacity building (RAY CAP) of youth workers and youth leaders involved in training/support activities in Erasmus+: Youth in Action. During this research project, 130 youth workers and youth leaders were each interviewed three times: once before a training activity, and twice after their training activity. The project was conducted in 17 European countries between 2014 and 2018.

RAY will be conducting a research project on the impact, role and potential of Strategic Partnerships in Erasmus+: Youth in Action (RAY INNO), which will investigate the role of Key Action 2 and the main instrument in KA2, Strategic Partnerships. For this project, more than 60 case studies of KA2 projects will be conducted in 16 European countries in 2019 and 2020.

WORKSHOP OBJECTIVES

- to share key findings from RAY on quality and innovation in youth work
- to introduce the RAY research project on innovation in the youth sector
- to give space for participants to formulate their own hypotheses on innovation



PROGRAMME

Duration: 90 minutes, approximately 35 participants

- Introductions, round of names and expectations
- Key findings from RAY on quality and innovation
- Intermittent: Participants could guess results and percentages using menti.com
- Buzz groups for discussion and reflection on findings
- Introducing upcoming research on innovation in youth work
- Discussion among participants: What would you expect to see as findings from this research project on innovation?

KEY ISSUES & TRENDS IDENTIFIED

• Aspects of quality in youth work in need of improvement:

- Developing training for experienced youth sector professionals
- Integrating digitalisation in youth work consistently & coherently
- Creating spaces to reflect on and discuss recent developments
- Finding ways to attract more newcomers to the programmes

• Main surprise in relation to youth work, quality and innovation:

Attendees of the workshop underestimated how many projects in Erasmus+: Youth in Action are run by voluntary youth leaders:

Participants thought that 31% of Erasmus+: Youth in Action projects were run by voluntary youth leaders, 31% by full-time youth workers, and 25% by part-time youth workers.



In reality, however, 55 % of Erasmus+: Youth in Action projects are run by voluntary youth leaders, 24% by full-time youth workers, and 10% by part-time youth workers.

Who runs the projects?

Voluntary youth leaders.	55.3%
Full-time youth workers.	24.0%
Part-time youth workers	9.5%
Other types of youth leaders.	11.2%



• Main (open) question on innovation for quality in youth work:

Do Strategic Partnerships really bring innovation to the sector that goes beyond their own project consortium?
